MAINTAIN AND ENHANCE THE TOWN'S RECREATION INFRASTRUCTURE

Complete Phase II "Interior Improvements" of the Community Recreation Center (CRC)

Community Recreation Center (CRC) – PR 1 & PR 2

(1) LA Kings Ice at Mammoth Lakes

(2) Mammoth RecZone

- SportCourt PowerGame+ install scheduled for May 8, 2024
- Public opening May 18, 2024

Lead and/or support efforts to provide multi-purpose, year-round, indoor, and outdoor recreation amenities in Mammoth Lakes.

(1) Mammoth Lakes Community Dog Park - PR 7

- Town Council awarded the bid to DG Construction. Work commenced in late September, with a 6-8 week completion schedule (weather dependent).
- Utilities and storm drains have been installed and rough grading completed.
- Contractors will resume work in the Spring (weather dependent), with the installation of fencing, gates, 5,000 sf of dog turf, prefabricated restroom, benches, dog waste leash posts and trash.
- Construction has been placed on winter suspension estimated completion, Spring 2024.

(2) Park at the Parcel – PR 12

- Playground equipment and fencing has been installed at the 2-5 childcare site.
- The larger 5-12 year old playground, restroom and community amenities has been scheduled for installation next spring/summer.

(3) Mammoth Arts and Cultural Center (MACC) – GF 9

- The Mammoth Lakes Foundation is moving forward with a 2-phased plan to renovate Edison Hall, which will then support an addition of a 250-seat theatre that will be connected to Edison Hall. The Edison Hall renovation is the first phase of the project and will commence this fall using private donor funds raised by the Foundation, followed by the second phase which is the construction of the theatre utilizing public funds (Measure C bond and Measure U funds).
- On February 21, Town Council adopted the Resolution approving the form and authorizing execution of certain lease financing documents in connection with the offering and sale of certificates of participation relating thereto to finance the cost of construction and equipping a new town facility and the cost of acquiring certain land and improvements and authorizing and directing certain actions with respect thereto.
- HMC and Town staff are reviewing the final design and cost estimate for the MACC.

(4) Edison Theatre

• The Edison Hall will be closed for renovations this spring/summer and will reopen in the fall. The existing Edison Theatre will be replaced with a smaller, black box rehearsal/theatre space to create enough room for support facilities for the new, larger theatre.

(5) Bike Park/Pump Track Concept – PR 9

- The bike park concept/pump track is identified in the Town of Mammoth Lakes 2022/23 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).
- Staff continue to explore potential sites for the facility.
- Funding is not secured for this project.

(6) Mammoth Lakes Bouldering Park – PR 10

- The Bouldering Park is a complementary amenity to the Bike Park/Pump Track concept and to the CRC and recreation destination concept.
- Staff will determine if this feature ca be incorporated into the Mammoth Creek Park West rehabilitation.
- Funding is not secured for this project.

(7) Mammoth Creek Park West Play Area.

- Redevelopment of open play area adjacent to the inclusive playground.
- Formal plans will be developed with a cost estimate and timing for implementation.
- Town Council allocated \$500,000 to rehabilitate the play area.
- Most recent site plan is included below:



Enhance recreation infrastructure to improve user safety, improve operations, and overall guest experience.

(1) Maintenance Best and NEXT practices

(2) Deferred Maintenance Program

Since 2017, the Town has invested over \$1million in deferred maintenance projects at parks and recreation fields, facilities, trails, and pools.

• Town staff received funding to repair the old ice rink concession and garage building.

(3) Amenities Enhancement Program

• No updates.

Work with Town Departments and community partners to leverage state and other resources to support regional arts and culture, events, and sports related facilities to leverage regional competitions and athlete training.

- Staff is coordinating with Mammoth Lakes Recreation on a potential grant submittal for the 2024 Arts in California Parks, Local Parks Grant Program.
- This new multi-year grant program intends to create local community connections to California's rich and diverse cultural history and natural areas in local parks. Eligible projects will enhance connections to local cultural history, local parks, open space or natural areas through community events, programming or installations that help to build sustainable community connections, health and well-being. The Local Parks Grants Program will be managed and administered by Parks California.

DELIVER HIGH-QUALITY, INNOVATIVE, AND AFFORDABLE RECREATION PROGRAMMING

Determine plan to revise, amend or develop new Parks and Recreation Master Plan/Trail System Master Plan that includes updated goals and policies, including an analysis of the supply, demand and needs for park and recreation facilities and services within and surrounding the Town of Mammoth Lakes.

The Town of Mammoth Lakes Parks and Recreation Master Plan was published in 2008 and adopted by Town Council on February 1, 2012. Resolution 12-08 approved a General Plan amendment adopting the Parks and Recreation Master Plan and amending the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Element. The Plan outlines the vision, goals, and tasks for enhancing parks and recreation for Mammoth Lakes through 2025.

The plan provides the foundation to promote personal health and well-being, foster community interaction, promote connectivity within and beyond the Town, nurture collaborative partnerships, and encourages appreciation of the Town's spectacular natural environment. The recommendations for parks and recreation elements outlined in the Master Plan are based on the results of field analysis, inventories, demand analysis, workshop planning sessions, and survey results from residents and second households.

Tremendous progress on delivering the recreation needs and expectations of the community have been made these past 16 years as highlighted in this report. The majority of these goals and tasks have been completed, with some underway, and others that require further analysis, funding and

appropriate sites for development. The values expressed in the PRMP continue to be relevant, along with the vision and framework to serve the recreation needs of Mammoth Lakes' residents and visitors. However, the stated goals, level of service recommendations, and primary tasks need to be realigned and reimagined with the ever changing and evolving recreation needs and expectations of the community, second homeowners, seasonal workers, and visitors to Mammoth Lakes.

On April 2, 2024, the Parks and Recreation Commission affirmed staff's recommendation to revise, amend or develop new Parks and Recreation Master Plan/Trail System Master Plans that include updated goals and policies, including an analysis of the supply, demand and needs for park and recreation facilities and services within and surrounding the Town of Mammoth Lakes.

To familiarize the commission with a master planning process, the <u>City of Burbank</u> in collaboration with <u>RJM Design Group</u>, is conducting a <u>City Parks Master Plan</u>. Staff recommend commissioners visit the project website to review the project description, timeline (12-months), community engagement strategies, project updates and results. The Master Plan is scheduled to be published in August, 2024.













2024/25 Recreation Programs Expense Budget by Category




2024/25 Whitmore Pool and Whitmore Recreation Area Expense Budget by Category



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
2024/25 Community Recreation Center Expense Budget by Category






2023 PARKS AND RECREATION ORGANIZATION CHART (PARKS MAINTENANCE ONLY)

Why hybrids and the need for additional fulltime staffing?

- Hybrids can fill the ongoing void we are having with filling seasonal staffing.
- We haven't filled summer seasonals in 3 5 years We only had one last year.
- Lack of seasonal staff results in higher overtime costs (\$30,000 FY2023/24) and more importantly, creates an unsustainable program of work for the full-time employees.
- Significant time saving for Human Resources and staff on rehiring, onboarding ad training seasonal employees each year
- 3 seasonal winter employees will not be returning this next year for snow removal operations. This will add **additional training for new hires.**
- Becoming significantly harder to find and train commercial drivers.
- Full-time employees are more committed to the Department and become key members of our high-performing and dynamic team!






