While this position will directly support the Inyo, it will be directly supervised by the Outdoor Recreation Manager.
Other Federal Support Related Items	Background Info & Relevance  ■ N/A	A letter has been drafted and sent in support of the SHRED Act which would also many Ski Area Permit Fees to remain on the Forest in which they were collected.  Due to recent federal layoffs and staffing shortages, TOML continues to engage with state and federal lawmakers related to impacts of these cuts. A letter highlighting these effects is being drafted and will be sent with the goal of stressing the various negative impacts on our recreation based economy.
